2021 Goals

<u>Summary of committee work</u>

We actively support community connectivity through sidewalks, trails, parks, greenways and public transportation. We educate and advocate for connectivity for the East and West communities through the CityLYNX Gold Line and the Carolina Thread Trail (XCLT2). We encourage equitable economic development and upward economic mobility by connecting people to schools of post-secondary and higher education and better paying jobs in Center City and in East communities.

- 1. Advocate for the City to formally adopt the Multi-Modal Transportation Connectivity Resolution that the County adopted on 9/15/2020.
 - The need to get the City and County on the same page for Active Transportation understanding remains a priority.
 - In June, following the adoption of the City's 2040 Comprehensive Plan, we met with the City's Transportation, Planning and Environment committee Chair Mayor Pro Tem Eiselt and Vice Chair Councilman Egleston to take up the review of the IGR Resolution, provide their feedback to the County's adopted version then present to the Council for a commitment on a shared definition for transportation. The City remains an elusive partner in the pursuit to closely align the City and County on a shared vision for multi-modal transportation.



- Engage City and County to operationalize the administrative, policy and programmatic needs for community connectivity via multi-modal transportation options by identifying "Near, Mid and Long Community Opportunities.
 - In January Merry Oaks Neighborhood resident Nancy Pierce and neighborhood president Russell Fergusson joined our committee meeting to update us on their advocacy work for Eastway Drive and Arnold Drive multimodal connectivity to Kilborne Park. Chris joined Nancy and Russell for a CDOT meeting in support of the needed connectivity.
 - In May Chris spoke at the City Council's public hearing in support of the budget for sidewalks, Bicycle Program, Vision Zero, XCLT and Corridors of Opportunity but pointed out this section of the budget fails to recognize the need for the planning and design of XCLT2. The Transportation Committee followed up with a letter to the Mayor and Council Members requesting support for planning and design of XCLT2 in the FY 2022 budget. Councilman Matt Newton requested the amendment to the budget but it lacked council support.
 - In May we utilized the UNC Charlotte Urban Institute's Virtual City Walk to highlight the near future plans for improved pedestrian and bicycle safety and connectivity on Kilborne Drive and Norland Road and the lack of safe connectivity on Eastway Drive for multi-modal transportation to access businesses, recreation and connectivity for residents' activities of daily life.
 - In July Maureen spoke with County Park & Recreation Capital Planning Division Director Bert Lynn and the City's Active Transportation Coordinator Scott Curry about the alignment of XCLT2 at the Eastland site. Both staff members confirmed XCLT2 is a priority and they both state they are collaborating.
 - In August the Transportation Committee and its westside XCLT2 and CityLYNX Gold Line partners held a Zoom meeting with westside City Councilman Malcolm Graham to understand his level of support for multimodal east/west transit. Councilman Graham requested time to engage



- with County Commissioner Jerrell and City Councilman Newton to become better informed on the subject. There will be a follow-up meeting between the east and west partners and Councilman Graham.
- In July the Transportation Committee sent a letter of support for a CATS grant to construct a pedestrian bridge over Independence Blvd at the location of the Bojangles Coliseum and Ovens Auditorium.
- 3. Facilitate and partner with the City and County to host East Community specific informational sessions in preparation for the 2021 Mobility Referendum.
 - On March 4, 2021 the Transportation Committee hosted a virtual meeting, a City conversation on <u>"The Future of Eastside Transit, Biking, Walking and Trail Connections."</u> Panelists: Taiwo Jaiyeoba Assistant County Manager, Liz Babson Director CDOT and John Lewis CATS CEO. Transportation Committee Chair and At-Large Representative Julie Eiselt, Vice Chair and District 1 Representative Larken Egleston and Committee Member and District 5 Representative Matt Newton were also present. 109 registered, 75 in attendance at this community meeting.
- 4. Continue our grassroots partnership with the Charlotte Regional Transportation Coalition (CRTC) to support the Charlotte Moves Task Force recommendations for the 2021 Mobility Referendum.
 - CRTC participation to support advocacy for CityLYNX Gold Line, Bus Prioritization, Silver Line, Meck Playbook and Strategic Mobility Plan.
 - In April the Transportation Committee attended Sustain Charlotte's Smart Growth Meeting; Strategic Mobility Plan.
 - In April Chris and Maureen were interviewed by Ely Portillo for an UNC Charlotte Urban Institute article on bus prioritization.
 - In June Maureen was interviewed by WSOC regarding the need for XCLT2 FY 2022 budget dollars for planning and design.
 - In June we began work on Dannie's strategy to pilot a message board in bike shops to compare trail connectivity between cities in NC, to ask viewers



where they want to connect and to respond to a brief survey through a QR code. The purpose of the project is to keep XCLT2 an essential complement to XCLT to equitably serve the City's SMP.

- In July Chris explored an UNC Charlotte partnership for a student study of the economic impact of XCLT2 and the feasibility of community and business outreach to move it forward.
- In November Chris and Maureen will attend UNC Charlotte Urban Institute's Engaged Scholarship Symposium to seek a community research partnership to advance an economic impact study for XCLT2.

- Continue to advocate for the City to formally adopt the Multi-Modal Transportation Connectivity Resolution that the County adopted on 9/15/2020. (Advocacy and Outreach)
- 2. Facilitate and partner with the City and County to host an East Community specific informational session on the Strategic Mobility Plan (SMP) in preparation for the 2022 Mobility Referendum. (**Advocacy and Outreach**)
- 3. Continue to engage the City and County staff and elected officials to operationalize the administrative, policy and programmatic needs for community connectivity via multi-modal transportation options by identifying "Near" (2022-2024), "Mid" (2022-2026) and "Long" (2022-2030) Community Opportunities. (**Targeted Engagement**)
- Continue our grassroots partnerships with the Charlotte Regional Transportation Coalition (CRTC) and seek out event opportunities within the east and west communities to advocate for east west community connectivity needs. (Community Partnership)
- 5. Grow the Transportation Committee's community involvement by adding two new community members. (**Community Partnership**)
- 6. Foster connections to support youth participation and diverse voices as part of the transportation committee work and in support of the CharlotteEAST mission, values and goals. (**Community Partnership**)
